




2022 Sources of Revenue

DON'S JOURNEY: FINDING SUPPORT AND NEW STRENGTHS



Don's resilience shines through when he talks about facing the challenges of epilepsy. He experienced a profound shift in his life after his diagnosis; he was forced into retirement, lost his driver's license, and struggled with his memory. "I wasn't the same person I was before", he recalls. He lost cherished memories like family vacations and falling in love with his wife. In the face of this deep loss, Don found the resolve to accept his circumstances and focus on treasuring the present moments.

One of the toughest challenges Don faced was navigating the shifting landscape of his emotions and its impact on his relationships with his family. Don explains, "I couldn't be the dad that could walk through a wall and help their kids. I wasn't that man anymore." He used to bottle up his emotions, but he could no longer do that. He explains, "I was told your bucket is full and it overflowed. And this is where it came out." While grappling with this new way of experiencing and reacting to the world, Don found solace in Epilepsy Ottawa.

Our UPLIFT program became a safe haven for Don to share his vulnerabilities. He admits, "It's sometimes easier to talk to others about your feelings than it is to your own family because I don't feel as vulnerable." With the help of this program, Don improved communication with his family. He now shares his feelings more openly instead of holding everything inside.

Don has a message for others struggling with epilepsy and the profound impact it has on all aspects of life: "You're not alone." Epilepsy Ottawa stands as a beacon of hope, offering crucial support, education, and understanding to individuals navigating the challenges of epilepsy. By sharing his story, Don encourages others to seek the help they need and reminds us all of the importance of community in overcoming life's toughest battles.



SANDI REGGLER:CREATING A SEIZURE SMART GENERATION

Sandi Reggler was a passionate advocate for epilepsy awareness long before she became an Epilepsy Educator. In fact, that's how she became involved with Epilepsy Ottawa after her daughter was diagnosed with epilepsy. "We wanted her classmates to learn about epilepsy and how to help if she had a seizure at school, so we contacted Epilepsy Ottawa and booked a presentation," Sandi says.

Since she joined the Epilepsy Ottawa team and began doing Seizure Smart presentations like the one her daughter's class received, her belief in the program's impact has grown. One of the most rewarding aspects of her job is seeing the students' interest and curiosity during the presentations. "The kids are very engaged, they ask questions and share ideas of how they can help someone having a seizure, what they can do," she shares with enthusiasm. She can see the students gain confidence in their ability to assist their friends with epilepsy.



Sandi enjoys educating young people about epilepsy and helping them overcome fear and stigma. "I want them to know that epilepsy is just one part of who their friend is, and that they can still do many things together," Sandi stresses, highlighting the importance of inclusion and acceptance.

As an educator and a parent, Sandi appreciates the peace of mind that Seizure Smart provides. "It makes me feel more comfortable knowing that my daughter's friends are aware of epilepsy and how to respond in case of a seizure," she says. Sandi also recognizes that education is key to preventing bullying and isolation, creating a safe and positive environment for her daughter and other children with epilepsy.

"When I was diagnosed with epilepsy, I felt lost and alone," Vicki shared. Epilepsy Ottawa became her guiding light, providing invaluable support through our UPLIFT program. It transformed her mindset, empowering her to reframe her thoughts and embrace a more optimistic outlook.

Inspired by the support she received, Vicki was determined to give back. Despite a postponed event due to the pandemic, she organized a birthday fundraiser for Epilepsy Ottawa on social media the following year. Surpassing her \$1,000 goal, the fundraiser raised an astonishing \$1,400, proving that every act of kindness counts.

Buoyed by the success, Vicki aimed higher this year, hoping to raise \$1,500 and spread epilepsy awareness. These efforts paid off and Vicki surpassed her goal, raising over \$1,700!

The fundraiser took place at St. John's Lutheran Church in Arnprior and Smitty's Home Hardware in Pembroke, where Vicki's community embraced her mission wholeheartedly. Baking, preserves, plant clippings, and cupcake-shaped balloon costumes added to the vibrant atmosphere. Vicki's mother played a significant role, crafting beautiful blankets that quickly found loving homes.

During the event, Vicki had a heartfelt conversation with a woman burdened by her epilepsy diagnosis. With empathy and resources from Epilepsy Ottawa, Vicki provided support, reminding her of the power of compassion and connection.

Vicki's purpose extends beyond fundraising; she aims to be a mentor, helping others navigate epilepsy's challenges and discover their inner strength. Grateful for her own personal growth, Vicki embraces each chapter of her life and serves as an inspiration to turn adversity into purpose.
